4. Please describe your feelings about the importance of making Sullivan a beautiful place to live, work, and visit, citing any role models and motivating factors.



Taking this role in 2020 put our administrative team in a very unique position as leaders. Being charged with the task of revisioning educational platforms as we lived in a world never seen before. I played a big role in training staff on how to deliver lessons to students who are home for long periods of time, as well as supporting staff and students through the emotional toll of the pandemic.

As the school environment gradually returned to a semblance of normalcy, it became evident that the needs of students and staff were changing. Our team needed to explore options aimed to address the emotional and mental well-being of all stakeholders. One big change we began looking at in 2022-2023 was a concept we now call "Flight Time". This venture of discovery began in September 2022 after our administrative team had heard of an idea called Power Lunch. We knew students needed time to enhance social-emotional development, and to strengthen relationships between students/students and students/teachers. The day is designed to increase equity and access to extracurricular and academic opportunities within the scheduled school day with 50 minutes of protected time in the middle of day: We take pride in this time as it:

- Strengthen Relationships
- Engages students in relevant real-life skills
- Increases opportunities to participate in school activities
- Increases academic support and intervention.
- Decompress time and reduces student fatigue
- Time built into the day to accomplish school related business

Flight time has become something that students and staff look forward to each and every day. We see an increase in classroom engagement, social growth amongst students, and academic success for students who struggled in years past.

I am blessed to have been given the opportunity to visualize a program for our students and staff that has been wonderful for everyone here. Students' needs go beyond the classroom and Flight Time is meeting some of those needs each and every day.
