

Love Thy Neighbor-

In 2016 we ran an initiative called Love Thy Neighbor. This was a program that my brother started in his town of Viburnum, MO, and after seeing its success we decided to run one in Sullivan. The concept is to provide homeowners who may have physical limitations, and or financial needs, with home repairs free of charge including: new roofs, decks, ramps, yard work, etc. The awesome thing about Love Thy Neighbor is that the teams are lead by adults but the project is carried out by students 6th through 12th grade. Myself, along with leaders from our church as well as two other churches in our community joined forces and were able to complete 18 projects in three days. Projects included two new roofs, two wheelchair ramps, new deck, multiple fences power washed and stained or painted, gutter clean-out and repair, tree and brush removal, and much more. All financial needs were raised ahead of time and we were able to compete around \$20,000 dollars of work free of charge to all of these homeowners. In all, over 80 people participated to see it to completion.

In 2017 we ran a smaller scale Love Thy Neighbor and finished 12 projects over the course of one weekend. Projects included one roof, new exterior stairs, deck removal and rebuild, tree and brush removal, deck staining, roof repairs, and gutter clean outs. Again, all money needed for material was raised in advance was completely free to the homeowners.

In 2018 we did another small scale Love Thy neighbor completing jobs for 6 homeowners.

In 2020 I lead a team of 35 Sullivan area students and adults to do Love Thy Neighbor in Viburnum, MO, at First Baptist Church Viburnum along with about 6 other area churches. In all around 125 people participated. In four days we were able to tear off and replace 4 roofs, multiple decks, and other construction projects. All projects were paid for through generous donors in the community as well as two fundraisers which raised over \$20,000.

In 2021 we were again given the opportunity to participate in Love Thy neighbor in Viburnum, MO, and likewise took around 35 students and adult leaders. We worked for four days straight completing many projects for homeowners in their community. Roofing projects, decks, ramps, and many other major projects were accomplished free to the homeowners.

in 2022 and 2023 we took around 40 students from Sullivan to Viburnum to continue the project and do thousands of dollars of jobs for homeowners with 2023 being our largest project ever. Throughout the last couple of years we have also been able to coordinate multiple projects in Sullivan for homeowners in our community including wheelchair ramps and other projects.

Love Thy Neighbor is not just a one time, one week concept. We hope and pray that the idea is something that becomes a lifestyle of helping others in need and I love seeing the next generation take the charge in doing so. The motto from last year sums it up well, the idea is that, "we do for others what they can't do for themselves, because Christ did for us, what we can't do for ourselves."

MRT-

MRT stands for Ministry Resource Team and is a way for our church to help Sullivan residents with rent and utilities when they fail on hard times. Our church is able to help on a weekly basis with people who are in need. It is a one time assistance but through the years has helped hundreds of families in our community get financial help when times get difficult.

Back to School Bash 2019, 2020, 2021-

Over the course of the last three years I have been privileged to be a part of a committee made up of many Sullivan churches and businesses which oversaw what we named Back to School Bash. Essentially, we wanted to make sure that every student in the Sullivan area had the ability to get food, school supplies, hair cuts, and clothing before heading back to school and making sure it was free for all families. In 2019 we held the event at the skating rink, and the last two years it has been at the Lifehouse Youth Center. It takes a lot of volunteers and willing hands to make it succeed and has helped hundreds of students each year since it began in 2019.

TBC Fall Festival 2015-Present -

One of the community events that our church has long since done is called Fall Festival which is on Halloween evening each year. Since 2015 I have had the opportunity to co-organize this event with some of our other staff and volunteers. While it changes in some regards each year, the idea behind it has always been to provide a safe environment for kids and their families to come play games, get food, and lots of candy in a safe environment. Each year we have anywhere from 600 to over 1000 parents and kids come through in just a couple of hours. It takes a lot of volunteers to make the event happen and it could not happen with them.

Board of Directors at TBC 2012-Present-

As part of the Pastoral Staff at Temple Baptist Church I have been a part of their board of directors since 2012. This is our main decision making board which is made up of the three pastoral staff, administrative assistant, and committee chairpersons.

Lifehouse Youth Center 2017-Present-

Since its inception, I along with our church, have been supportive of our amazing Youth Center. Before it was ever here, simply hearing Jen's vision and desire for the Center got me hooked. It is an amazing work and our church supports them financially each month and I help organize weekly meals each Thursday as well. When I was able for the first couple of years, I made it a point to spend a couple of hours every week spending time with the kids. I can't say enough about the Youth Center and the amazing staff that keep it running everyday!

Upwards basketball coach in 2018 & 2019-

As my oldest son got older I was able to co-coach and coach his team for a couple of years. I know the Upwards programs are difficult to run after having many conversations with the leadership, but they are very beneficial to teaching and shaping the next generation and I appreciate those that made it happen through the years.

Meramec Community Mission, 2012-Present —

With my position at the church, it is one of my duties to see that we are supporting other organizations who are serving our community in big ways. TBC has always been very involved in

financially supporting the Meramec Community Mission and the way that it helps provide food and clothing to those in need. I have also had the privilege of helping a couple of times in the past few years with some of the food drives they hold on a regular basis as well as bringing groups to organize and deliver food.

- 4. Please describe your feelings about the importance of making Sullivan a beautiful place to live, work, and visit, citing any role models and motivating factors.

I believe the role of service to our community is vitally important and I believe seeing its importance from an early age helps foster that mindset and helps establish those values more firmly. I was born and raised in Sullivan, spent all of my years in the Sullivan school systems, and have been a part of the same church I am now a pastor at since I was born in 1987. My family has certainly played a huge role in leading and shaping me into who I am today, but outside of flesh and blood, my church family has essentially been a huge part in raising me and shaping me into who I am today. I could list name after name after name of individuals who have influenced me through the years: mentors, older men from the church, Sunday school teachers, my youth pastor, and the list goes on. Outside of this, there have been so many community members and mentors who have coached my baseball or basketball teams, or been influential teachers and mentors and even administrators. So many names and faces make up the tribe that helps raise a child and teach and shape them into responsible well rounded adults.

From an early age I knew my service to God was first and foremost and out of that relationship my service to my those around me was, likewise, vital and important. When I was in high school I knew I felt called to full time ministry and was unsure at the time what that would look like. However, after graduation I was given the opportunity to serve on staff in the same church I was raised in. I now had the opportunity in 2006 and following to serve the same community that served me all those years growing up. From an intern, to worship leader, to youth and worship leader, to Associate Pastor of Students, Worship, and Missions and Outreach, I have been able to serve our church and community in a wide variety of ways through the last 15 years. One of the biggest ways I get to do that is through leading short term mission trips with student and adult teams here in Sullivan, St. Louis, across the United States, and all over the world.

Beginning in 2016 I have had the opportunity to participate in Love Thy Neighbor which I spoke about earlier. We have the opportunity to serve our literal neighbors right here in Sullivan through acts of service for people in need and who are unable to do the work themselves. However, loving our neighbor does not simply include loving the people that simply live inside the boundaries of Sullivan, MO. One of the privileges I have as pastor is leading students and adults on short term mission trips year in and year out all over the world. It helps us all see that there is just as much, and sometimes even more, of a need with our neighbors across the United States and in countries all over the world.

In 2015 I co-lead a group from Sullivan to Guatemala to work with an orphanage we support and to provide dental and other basic needs to families in desperate need. Later that year I lead a group of 40 students and adults to Kansas City to do a Vacation Bible School at a church in the inner city and just got to love on kids and tell them about Jesus. In 2017 I lead a group of around 40 students and adults to Detroit to work with an organization cleaning up abandoned neighborhoods and beautifying the city. In 2018 and 2019 we went back to Guatemala where we not only provided dental but now were able to provide the people with prescription eyeglasses who would otherwise not have access to such things. Later 2018 I had the opportunity to lead another student trip with about 35 students to Wharton, TX, where we helped victims rebuild and clean their homes after hurricane Harvey. I lead another student trip in 2019 to North Carolina where we did a variety of services and ministries for kids and adults ranging from cleanup, yard work, and painting to VBS, homeless shelter work, and much more. In 2021 we were able to go to Jackson, TN, and worked at a Boys and Girls Club. 2021 also allowed me to help our church form partnerships in the St. Louis Metro area as well as in Turkey. In St. Louis we are able to come alongside a church there and help them financially and physically as they begin to serve their community. In Turkey, we have been able to send teams to come alongside missionaries as they serve displaced refugees who have fled their homelands and are seeking to build new lives in a different location. In 2022 and 2023 I co-lead a team to Guatemala where we continued to serve in an orphanage as well as the people in and around that community. I also lead large teams from our community in those two years to Viburnum for Love Thy Neighbor as well as Fort Worth, TX, and Pensacola, FL to do mission work. Our Florida trip in 2023 was our largest student group ever with 70 participants going.

With all of this being said, I feel we have an obligation to our neighbors here in Sullivan and need to diligently be about serving and loving on people who live right next door. Likewise, our obligation and calling doesn't need to stop at the Franklin County line and needs to extend to our neighbors all over the world. That is simply one of the things I love about my position as pastor. I am able to help students and adults from our small community in Sullivan see that we can make a massive global impact no matter the age, financial, or social standing. We simply need to have a heart that is willing to say yes, and hands that are willing to get a little messy.


One-Paragraph Summary --

I have been a pastor in our community for 12 years and was born and raised in Sullivan. My wife Briana works at Spring Bluff Elementary as the school nurse and is there with our three older children Kaleb, Khloe, and Kallie. Our youngest, Konnor, attends preschool at iXL Academy here in Sullivan, I have been able to coach upwards basketball, little league baseball, soccer, and basketball. I have lead the student ministry at TBC for many years, as well as supporting our local youth center in a variety of ways. Much of what I do is involved with student ministry and influencing and mentoring the next generation. My ultimate goal is to make disciples of Christ, and in doing so, much of what Christ did on earth was serving others. The Bible says Jesus came to serve not to be served, and that is ultimately what I hope to convey to the students and adults that I have the privilege of serving. Helping students see that the world is much bigger than themselves, and that even at a young age, they can effect change not only in our community but in our world as a whole. This is why we do a lot of local missions and outreach as well as missions around the United States and abroad. It is such a blessing when the residents of Sullivan can extend their reach to other places in our country and across the globe to love and to serve. When I think about service in our community, I cannot help but think of Jesus' two greatest commands: Love God, and love your neighbor as yourself. There is no better way to show someone you care for them than to go out of your way to serve them.


